## Reading 101 2011State Snapshot Report Report Card

## **Overall Results**

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Rhode Island was 222. This was higher than the average score of 220 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Rhode Island in 2011 (222) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (223) and was higher than their average score in 1992 (217).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Rhode Island at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 44 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1992 (45 points).
- The percentage of students in Rhode Island who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 35 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (36 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (28 percent).
- The percentage of students in Rhode Island who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 70 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (69 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (63 percent).



average score that was 26 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was narrower than that in 1998 (35 points).

In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 23 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1992 (31 points). In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 26 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1992 (40 points). In 2011, female students in Rhode Island had an average
