- ❑ Training provides educators with the skills, habits of mind, and collaboration to create a **transparent data culture** in schools and districts

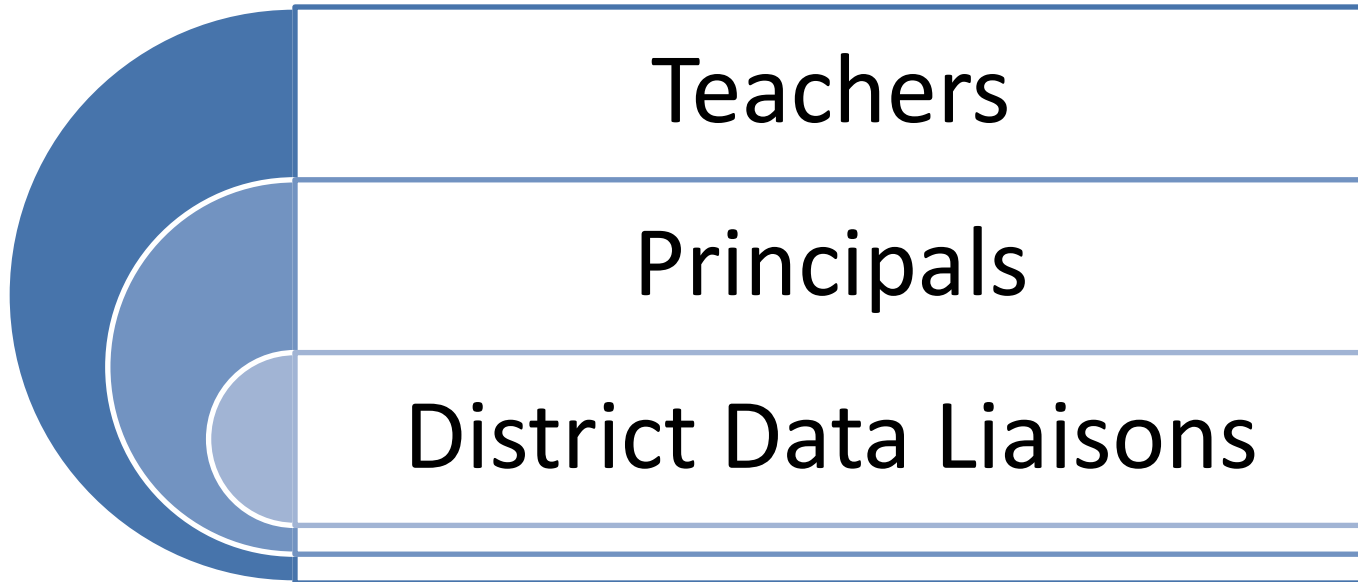
What is Data Use Professional Development?

 - ❑ 7 Data Analysis Coaches

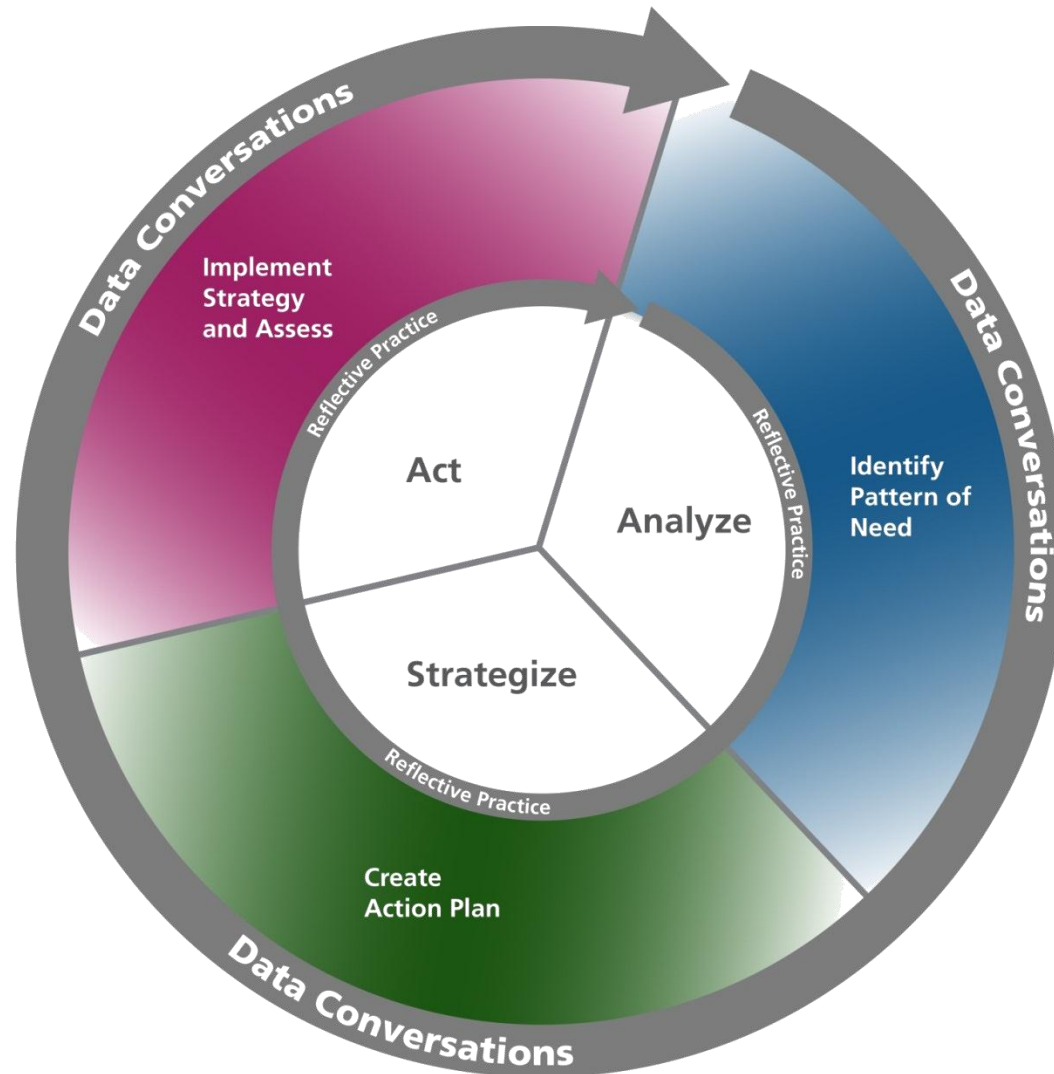
