RIDE Readiness-Based Graduation Requirements: Annual Parent/Guardian Update Requirement Guidance and Resources

Introduction:

The Rhode Island Department of Education (RIDE) is committed to ensuring all students have access to high-quality curriculum and instruction as essential components of a rigorous education that prepares every student for success in college and their career. On November 15, 2022, the R.I. Council on Elementary and Secondary Education approved [Readiness-Based Graduation Requirements](#) for all R.I. students. RIDE’s adoption of Readiness-Based Graduation requirements presents an opportunity for reimagining high school education in Rhode Island K-12 schools. Specifically, this has presented the opportunity to develop innovative approaches to ensure all students graduate high school ready to create their own futures and to pursue their postsecondary goals.

Purpose of this document:

This document aims to provide clarity, guidance and resources for schools and districts implementing the new Readiness-Based Graduation Requirements, specifically as it relates to the requirement for schools to provide annual notification to parents/guardians of the progress their child/children are making towards **graduation**, and **on college and career benchmarks**.

Annual Parent/Guardian Update Requirement - Overview:

The adoption of Readiness-Based Graduation Requirements establishes the expectation that parents/guardians shall be provided with an annual update on the progress their child/children are making towards academic performance targets necessary for earning a diploma and graduating ready for college and career success.

Annual Parent/Guardian Update Requirement for Graduation – Summary Chart:

Beginning with students in the graduating class of 2028:
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Schools are expected to provide the parents and/or guardians of all students with an annual update on the progress their child or children are making towards academic performance targets necessary for the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Earning a Rhode Island High School Diploma; ○ Graduating eligible to apply for general admission at the University of Rhode Island and Rhode Island College; and ○ Completing a RIDE-Approved Career and Technical Education Program.

What should be included in an annual parent/guardian update?

Schools are expected to provide the parents and/or guardians of all students with an annual update (in the preferred language of each student’s parent/guardian) on the progress their child or children are making towards academic performance targets necessary for the following:

1. Earning a Rhode Island High School Diploma;

2. Graduating eligible to apply for general admission at the University of Rhode Island and Rhode Island College; and
3. Completing a RIDE-Approved Career and Technical Education Program.

RIDE recommends that the following components are included in the annual update provided by schools:

FAQs

1. Why are schools required to provide annual updates to parents/guardians?

Parents and guardians play a crucial role in the education of a child, and while there exist pockets of excellence throughout the state in terms of keeping parents informed, this is an area we must focus on improving across the board. According to the [XQ+RI Statewide Educational Opportunity Audit \(2020\)](#): 2 out of 3 parents said they do not receive regular updates on the progress their kids are making toward college/career goals. Also, 1 out of 2 parents said they are not informed when their kids struggle in their classes.

Our families deserve to receive regular updates on the progress their students are making towards the academic and technical performance targets necessary to earn a diploma, and to graduate ready for success in both college and career. This is why every high school in Rhode Island is now required to provide every student's parent/guardian an annual update on these benchmarks.

2. Are report cards, or progress reports the same thing as an annual parent notification?

It is possible, but not necessarily. As mentioned above, already 2 out of 3 parents do not receive regular updates on the progress their students are making toward college/career goals. While schools are encouraged to leverage existing effective communication structures, the information included, and the delivery mechanism for informing parents may need to be

enhanced or improved in many schools and districts.

3. How can schools ensure that they effectively communicate this update to parents/guardians who speak a language other than English?

Updates must be provided in the preferred language of each student’s parent/guardian. Schools are encouraged to leverage existing, effective communication structures with families so this may present an opportunity to bridge with the required MLL parent information sharing that is required to happen annually.

Additionally, included in RIDE’s 5-Year Action Plan is the intent commitment that RIDE will launch a multilingual communications campaign to make families aware of this new expectation and the rights they have to be informed about their child's progress toward college and career ready outcomes. RIDE will also partner with parent and community groups to develop best practice models and additional guidance for schools on providing these annual updates to parents including a specific focus on effectively communicating with and supporting families of multilingual learners.

4. Can the Individualized Learning Plan (ILP) platform that our school uses be leveraged to provide parents/guardians with annual updates? (Ex: Naviance, Xello, etc.)

Yes, this is allowable through a parent portal or other mechanism within the ILP platform so long as it is inclusive of the required details about a student’s progress toward graduation and college and career benchmarks.
